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

BOMBER COMMAND REPORT ON NIGHT OPERATIONS

2/3rd MARCH, 1944.

SUMMARY.

- 1. The aircraft factory at Herlan les Meureaux, hear Paris, was successfully attacked by a force of Halifaxes. More cloud was met over the target than had bee expected, but the T.I. of the Mesquites were clearly visible, and the bombing was highly concentrated. So severely was the factory damaged that the Germans abandoned the use of it after the raid.
 - 2. Lencasters of 5 Group achieved equal success in an attack on the aere-engine works at Albert, which they almost entirely destroyed with 12,000 lb bombs.

 Mosquitos attacked targets in the Ruhr, and the military construction at Sottewast, while other aircraft laid mines off N.W. France, dispersed leaflets, and attacked enemy airfields. From the night's operations, all our aircraft return underaged.

WEATHER FORECAST.

3. Midnight frontal positions: - Occlusion from Bordeaux to Alps to Vienna, an possibly minor troughs in polar air.

Bases:- Fit all night, with little cloud and good visibility. Scattered snow showers.

Germany:- Heavy convection cloud to above 20,000' over North Sea, spreading inland to the edge of high ground. Good breaks in residual convection cloud over Middle Rhine. Layers of cloud at various levels in S.

Fethod of Attack. 6 OBOE Mosquitos were to mark the aiming-point with red T.I., operating on Channels 1 and 3. A single Mesquito on Channel 2 was to release greens, but these were expected to be less accurate. Main Force aircraft, approaching the target from 293°, were to wait in the area until the T.I. went do and aim at the centre of reds, or, if none were visible, at the centre of the greens. (The T.I. were to burst at 4,000°). Aircraft of 4 Group were to bomb from 8,000° and 6 Group from 6,000°. All were to carry mixed loads of 1,000-lb M.C. and 500-lb M.C. bombs. No incendiaries were to be dropped.

WEATHER EXPERIENCED.

9. Bases: - Fit all night.

Route and Target:- 8/10ths strate-cumulus over Channel, tens 8-10,000', i creating to 8-10/10ths over target, base 6,000', tops 8-10,000'. Later in the attack, cloud broke to 3-5/10ths. Slight ground haze. No moon. Good visibili below cloud.

NARRATIVE OF ATTACK.

11. Hest of the Mesquites experienced OBCE failure, and only 2 attacked, dropped T.I. at zero + 6 and mero + 12 respectively. The first salve fell 500 yards N. of the aiming-point; the second, on the N.E. corner of the factory. From zero + 6, 2 large fires developed in the factory testing hangars; and between zero + 12 and zero + 21, more fires started near the main assembly shops, S. of the maintenance shops and in the scaplane base. Towards the end of the raid, the target became obscured by smoke.

DAY RECONNAISSANCE

12. Photographs obtained on the day after the attack showed at least 470 crater in the target area, over half of the factory being destroyed. The scaplane base and the factory testing hangars were entirely flattened; the main assembly shops, the machine shops, the electric power plant and the maintenance shops were virtuall destroyed; and direct hits were secred on the railway to the S. of the airfield, aircraft helter, and reads leading to the target. As the result of this raid, its Germans have abandoned production at the aircraft factory.

ENE S' DEFENCES

 Negligible opposition was not from the ground defences. 19 fighters were seen, including 10 over the target, but no attacks were made.

CASUALTIES

14. From this attack, all aircraft returned safely.

ALBERT

15. 15 Lancasters of 617 Squadron were detailed to attack the aero-engine works of the Cie Mecanique d'Albert. The weather was clear over the target and, although

leader's bombsight was u/s, his deputy marked the aiming-point successfully, it aircraft attacked. llxl2,000 lb. berbs were arepped. Reconnaissance showed the target was almost entirely destroyed, while the adjacent factory of S.N.C.A. ord, also engaged on the production of aero-engines, was more than helf denoliphed, ttle flak was encountered, but all the aircraft returned undamaged.

MUNCHEN GLADBACH

8 Mosquitos (3 Mk.I and 5 non-OBCE) were despatched to Munchen Gladbach. All OBCE aircraft made successfully controlled runs, and dropped green T.I. The or 5 attacked on GEE/DR, confirmed by the position of the T.I., and dropped to 1b. bembs.

KREFELD

1 Mk.I Mosquito attacked the Edel steel works at Krefeld. Interference was, and the navigator reported a rough release.

AACHEN .

3 Mk. I Mosquitos bombed Acchen on OBOE.

SCTTEVAST

l Mk.II FOUNTAIN PEN was detailed against the military construction at ttevast; but its precision device failed, and it bombed the target area on D.R. .

MINELAYING

. 6 Stirlings, out of a force of 8, laid 35 mines off N.V. France. The other reruft abendened their task.

LEAFLETS

8 Wellingtons scattered leaflets over M. France; 2 returned early.

Berlin 16 non-CBCE Mosquitoes were sent on a harassing raid against rlin. 15 attacked the primary, mostly on D.R. from steady flores dropped by aircraft over the Dummer See. The remaining aircraft had a technical failure, d bombed Osnabruck. All returned undamaged.

Dusseldorf 10 Mosquities (2 Mk.I, 2 Mk.II PANWIFER, 2 Mk.II FOUNTAIN-PEN at 4 non-OBOE) were despatched to Dusseldorf. One OBOE aircraft of each type ade a successfully controlled run, and dropped red T.I. which were beauted by the in-OBOE aircraft; the others attacked on D.R. from precision fixes, because (OBOE failure. No aircraft was lost; one damaged its underearringe in a taying accident.

Krefeld: Sottevast: 1 Mk.I Mosquito was sent against the Edel steel-works krefeld; but its device failed, and it bembed on D.R. Another Ed.I detailed attack the military construction at Sottevast underwent the same experience. the returned undamaged.

Ifinelaying 45 Stirlings, Wellingtons and Halifaxes were despatched to by mines off the French Channel and Atlantic perts. 42 completed their taks, bying 121 mines. All returned un spaged.

Leaflets 6 Wellingtons, out of a force of 9 sent out from Training croups, scattered leaflets over towns in Northern France. No casualties were tastained.

Met. Recce One Mosquito carried out a ret. recct. flight without incident.

BATHER FORECAST

Bases:- Mainly fine, with little cloud; but the whole of East Anglia, and the coastal districts of Yorkshire and Lincolnshire, will be affected by snow showers. Moderate visibility. Local smoke troubles after midnight.

Additional diversions were provided the minelaying operation in the Paltic, the attack on Berlin, and the unusually rtherly direction of the first half of the route, both of which must have eggested to the enemy that an attack on Burlin was to be made, fellowing up e caylight assaults on the previous day.
