Kairouan Area	1st August		The Squadron stood down today. Many of the aircrew and ground crew took advantage of the rest and went to Sousse for a good swim. The weather has been very hot and dusty.		
	2nd August		We were called on to supply 12 aircraft to attack the Marshalling Yards at NAPLES. All aircraft were bombed up and took off without incident. The attack was quite successful although a haze was noticeable over the target area. The defences were poor and only light inaccurate flak, compared to previous attacks.		
	3rd August		16 aircraft were pumped up and took off to bomb target PAOLA. 2 aircraft carried 4000 pound bombs which were dropped successfully within the marshalling yards. All aircraft reached target area, unloaded their bomb-loads and good pictures were taken. Visibility was good with a slight haze off SICILY. Credit is given to the ILLUMINATOR who did a good job and made identification of the target easy. The raid was considered very successful. All aircraft returned to base.		
	4th August		Once again MESSINA was the target for tonight. 9 aircraft were bombed up, 2 with 4000 pound bombs, the balance carrying 500 pound loads. Identification of target was difficult due to cloud and haze; however the illuminator reached the target area and the attack was considered successful. Many fires and explosions were noticeable. Light flak and very inaccurate.		
	5th August		10 aircraft were bombed up and took off to attack MESSINA BEACHES, CAPE PELORO. Visibility was very poor, but target identified by aid of flares. Fires were noticeable at many points.		
	6th August		7 aircraft were asked for tonight to attack the marshalling yards at NAPLES. The raid was very successful and bombs were seen to burst within the yards. Moderate heavy but accurate flak at 14,000 feet with light tracer up to 10,000 feet. Searchlights in comes, operating with flak. It was good raid and many aiming point pictures taken.		
	7th August		We were asked to supply 10 aircraft. They were bombed up and took off for target SCALETTA/CAPE BARRE. One aircraft returned early due to constant speed unit becoming unserviceable. Their bomb load was jettisoned and all exploded. Target area clearly visible. Bombs seen to burst and buildings blow up and many fires. Flares and moonlight very effective. Raid considered very good. No flak.		
	8th August		MESSINA and CAPE PELORO were our target tonight. 10 aircraft were bombed up and took off without incident. All reached target area, which was identified by flares. Some light flak very ineffective. The raid was considered successful as many bombs were seen to burst along the beaches.		
	9th August		11 aircraft were bombed up and took off to attack MESSINA BEACHES again. One aircraft returned early due to electrical failure. Their bombs were jettisoned safe, exploding in the sea. Identification of target difficult, due to clouds. Raid not considered satisfactory. Bombs were dropped on Beaches and around target area. Pictures not clear.		
	10th August		10 aircraft were asked for to attack MESSINA and CAPE PELORO. All were bombed up and took off. One aircraft returned early due to engine trouble. This aircraft crashed on landing as undercarriage would not lock. The aircraft caught fire and was completely destroyed. All the crew were able to leave aircraft safely. The raid was considered successful, good pictures were taken and many fires reported. Bob Hope and party put on a show at 236 Wing today for all Wellington Squadrons. The show was a great success, with a very large attendance from all Squadrons. It was held at 1500 hours.

	11th August		10 aircraft were bombed up and took off to attack the Beaches between CAPE PELORO and MESSINA. One aircraft also took off to drop NICKELS over LEGHORN/PISA. The 10 aircraft claimed to have bombed primary. Results were good. Small amount of light and heavy flak. NICKELS were dropped as detailed. All aircraft returned safely.		
	12th August		12 aircraft took off to bomb target, the Beaches between CAPE PELORO and MESSINA again. The target was reached. All bombs were dropped and the raid was considered quite successful. Very heavy flak around CAPE PELORO, with a few searchlights. Two aircraft were reported missing. S/L. Gourlie, R.N. (10477) Pilot and crew. Sgt. Ludgater, A.G. (133342) Pilot and crew.		
	13th August		After 11 days of operations without a stand down, the Squadron stood down today. The ground crew have done a spendifid job and much credit goes to them for their consistent work and untiring efforts. S/L. Gourlie, commonly known as "DODD", who was reported missing yesterday, turned up at the Squadron today. The starboard engine of his aircraft caught fire and he was forced to crash land 40 miles from here, after take-off. His Bombaimer, P/O. NODDER, H.J. (JA 14733), suffered injuries to his ankle and was admitted to hospital at TUNIS. The rest of the crew were reported safe. During the month many good movies were shown and the usual M.B.'s to the rest camp took place. The boys really are having a nice rest at those camps, which consists chiefly swimming, eating and sleeping. A total blackout was declared due to the appearance of enemy aircraft over our area. No bombs were dropped. The weather has been dusty and hot. Sickness is now less than 1 per cent.		
	14th August		13 aircraft took off after being bombed up, to attack the beaches in the vicinity of PIZZO and TANZIA. Small craft, the Beaches, the railway line and villages were bombed. Many fires were reported to be burning fiercely. Visibility good in spite of haze. Raid was considered a success. 2 aircraft were reported missing. P/O. LONG, A.B. (J-14874) Pilot and crew. Sgt. PARK, J.M. (1434080) Pilot and crew.		
	15th August		12 aircraft were detailed to attack VITERBO. All were bombed up and took off. 9 aircraft bombed target area and due to majority of flares falling wide of aiming point many bomb bursts were scattered. 2 large fires were reported in marshalling yards. The raid was not a general success. One aircraft returned early and one aircraft crashed landed away from base due to engine failure. All crew safe. Visibility fair with slight ground haze.		
	16th August		11 aircraft took off to raid the BEACHES between MARITRA and PAVATI. Barges North of PALMI were heavily attacked. No activity visible on the beaches. Built up areas were also attacked. It is presumed enemy aircraft were being used as decoys. SUCCESSFUL OPERATION. Defences hit.		
	17th August		11 aircraft were bombed up and took off to attack target BRATICO and CAP SUVERO. There were no noticeable concentrations of barges or personnel on the beaches. Bombs were seen to burst in the vicinity of the aiming point. It is believed fuel storage supplies were struck, causing flames to reach a height of 400 feet. One aircraft failed to return. P/O. A.W. FREEMAN (J-16400) Pilot and crew		
	18th August		The Squadron stood down today. Many parties from the different sections deserved the day off. The "Med." even with its Jelly Fish is like a magnet. The boys endure the long trips in open trucks to SOUSSE in order that the abling waters of the Blue Mediterranean may refresh them.

Kairouan Area	18th August		(Cont'd) This is an opportunity to mention something about the Ground Crew. These lads are doing a real job. To start a major and really finish it is something to be proud of, especially under our present conditions. Serviceability is almost 100 percent. F/O. Guy Money, Engineer of our Squadron has the situation well in hand and the lads are behind him in everything he does. The Cooks are putting up a good show, how they transform Iron Rations into the class of meals they serve, is beyond the comprehension of most of us. Of course we take advantage of native fruits, etc. Working conditions in the orderly room are sometimes not the best, temperatures ranging from 100° to 120°, plenty of dust and a daily wind storm. Morale is high throughout the Squadron.		
	19th August		11 aircraft took off to bomb the marshalling yards at FOGLIA. 10 aircraft reached primary target and one aircraft returned early due to engine trouble. The target was easily identified by aid of flares and accurate bombing of yards was noticeable. Large fires were seen west of FOGLIA. Defences were moderate heavy and accurate flak. No searchlights. All aircraft landed at diversionary aerodromes due to zero ceiling in our area. Good raid.		
	20th August		8 aircraft were bombed up and took off to attack the marshalling yard at VILLA LITERNO. Excellent illumination from flares. It is assumed electrical installations and railway tracks were hit. Many scattered fires. Very little flak. Successful raid.		
	21st August		11 aircraft took off to attack the marshalling yards at BATTIPAGLIO. One aircraft bombed SALERNO. Many bombs were seen to burst in the yards and built up area of town. It is believed a 4000 pounder hit electrical installations. Defences negligible. Visibility good. Raid successful.		
	22nd August		Stand down.		
	23rd August		10 aircraft were bombed up and took off to attack BAGNOLI marshalling yards. One aircraft returned early, unable to close escape hatch which blew open on take off. Raid considered a successfu; bombs were seen to burst within Steel Works and Yards. Light flak and ineffective searchlights.		
	24th August		12 aircraft successfully raided target TORRE ANNUNCIATA. One aircraft, an illuminator, returned due to port engine vibrating. All bombs were jettisoned safely. Many good sized fires were seen within target area. A JU 88 was seen, evasive action taken by our aircraft. Many direct hits were recorded.		
	25th August		10 aircraft were detailed to attack TARANTO. Only 9 aircraft attacked primary. One aircraft returned early due to constant speed unit becoming unserviceable in port engine. Illuminator flares were well placed in target area. Slight heavy flak bursting at 1/15000 feet. Lots of smoke over marshalling yards, may be smoke screen. Many bomb bursts seen at aiming point.		
	26th August		Stand down. A large number of aircrew went swimming, with exception of those who had applied for a commission. W/C. McIntosh interviewed 27 applicants.		
	27th August		10 aircraft were bombed up and took off to attack target SALERNO. One aircraft returned early hydraulics being unserviceable. Flares were well positioned and crews had no difficulty in identifying target. Bombs were seen to burst in the marshalling yards. Heavy flak. No searchlights. Raid successful.

	26th August		7 aircraft were detailed to bomb up and take off to attack the Marshalling Yards at TARANTO. One aircraft returned early due to generator trouble. Ship in harbour laid a smoke screen south of Yards. Our flares were accurately placed and aiming point easily seen. It is claimed many direct hits were registered. The raid was successful. Defences: inaccurate heavy flak.		
	29th August		10 aircraft were bombed up and took off to raid target TORRE ANNUNZIATA, including one aircraft to drop incendiaries on LEGHORN/PIAZZA VERGOGGIO. Bombing was well concentrated. Many bomb bursts were observed on marshalling yards, including two 4000 pounders. Very little flak over target, none at nickelling target. Raid successful.		
	30th August		Stand down (Wing). Many personnel went to SOUSSE and TUNIS. Movies were shown in the evening.		
	31st August		6 aircraft were detailed and successfully attacked SALERNO. All returned safely to base. Opposition was more active, however bombs were seen bursting on the vicinity of the marshalling yard and in Town area. A smoke screen is believed to have been used.
