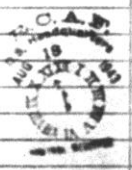

Thetford	July 1/40		<p>Lowering clouds and threatening rain storms did not dampen the spirits of the detachment of 40 A.C.F., 2 W.D.'s, 6 corporals, 2 Sgts. and one P/Sgt. under command of Flt/Lt. W.N. Thomson J. 3524 with P/Lt. G.T. Sutherland, Adjutant, as they embarked at the Alton's Mess Site for the trip to Ripon. Best blues were freshly pressed and buttons and shoes shone brightly despite lack of modern facilities on this partly completed station. Arriving in Ripon, the 438 flight debused and fell in smartly and were soon marching through the streets of this old walled town with heads erect and arms swinging. On reaching the cathedral along with several flights from other nearby R.C.A.F. stations, all ranks filed into the imposing edifice and took their seats just before the special service arranged by No. 6 Group R.C. to commemorate Dominion Day started at 1000 hours. The impressive service lasted an hour, and was attended by the town Council and other notables in their quaint livery, numerous civilians including a number of children, and high ranking officers from No. 6 Group R.C. and R.C.A.F. stations and units, including our C.O., G. Harris, C.N. 17876. After the service ended with the National Anthem the troops fell in and marched back to the parking lot and prepared for the return trip to Thetford, arriving just in time for lunch. This Dominion day celebration will long be remembered by all Canadians who were privileged to take part in it. However by 1330 hrs. all ranks were once again busy on the job of getting this station and Squadron into Operational shape. Thalburg	July 2/43.		Work on the station is progressing slowly but surely and Sgtn. personnel are arriving daily. Many difficulties of organization still exist and lack of supplies and equipment is a problem. A muster parade of all aircrew was held in the new crew room at 1100 hours today and W/C G.M. Harris, 37876, S. Jnr. C.O. spoke briefly to the assembled gathering of 130 all ranks, welcoming them to this new Sgdn. and outlining his plans for the future and stating clearly but good naturedly what kind of co-operation he must have from one and all. We are indeed fortunate in having a man of the type of W/C. G.M. Harris, 37876 as C.O. of 44 Squadron.		
Thalburg	July 3/43.		We are still very short of some trades, especially Reef cooks and waitresses and also compass adjusters, etc. Messia and No. 6 Group are being requested by phone and signal every other day or so to post in these requirements. A/C. Callaghan, M.C., D.F.C., Station, Base Commander paid a visit to Sgdn. H.Q. this morning and conf. with W/C. G.M. Harris, 37876. In the evening a softball team representing the Station but including men from 44 Sgdn. played a game at Union, losing a tight game 2 to 1.		
Thalburg	July 4/43.		Church services at 1100 hrs. for R.C.'s and 1200 hrs for Protestants were well attended, after which all ranks went back to work as we are on a seven day week here and no double pay for overtime or Sundays either except for the civilians employed by the contracting firm.		
Thalburg	July 5/43.		Supplies and personnel continue to come in slowly but we are still woefully weak in some trades and in stationary. The staff officers from No. 6 Group H.Q., appearing very keen and well groomed as staff officers always do, paid us a visit this afternoon and after surveying our rather primitive surroundings, promised us their fullest co-operation. A softball game between teams from No. 4 and 6 Sgdn. representing H.Q. and 44 Sgdn. this evening provided some laughs and a 21 to 12 win for H.Q.

Thalrose	Jul 8/45		<p>More non-operational flying took place today as P/L J.E. Morley, J.1562 and crew, Sgt. F.S. Harrison, S.106618 and crew, P/O I.L. Colchester, J.6032 and crew, P/O Dan, S.H. J.16318 and crew, Sgt. Lottle, O.E.128019 and Sgt. H. Green, 1096280 and crew got back into flying once again. Local flying and some practice landings were indulged in over the nearby Stroud area and several hits and near misses were claimed. The ever popular game of softball is an almost nightly feature on the fine local playing field near No. 1 Mess and is drawing an ever-increasing number of interested although rather bewildered RAF spectators. We may yet experience the identical ones that it is slightly different to boundaries. Track and field events are in the sports spot events in this week as several airmen of this Station are practicing for the meet to be held at Bicester on July 13/45.</p>		
Thalrose	July 10/45		<p>Continued bad weather prevented any flying today and the airmen seemed very quiet and almost despondent. It is cold and wet and windy today and more like winter than the middle of summer. More personnel are arriving daily and our strength is nearing the 500 mark but we are still badly in need of key personnel such as cooks, clerks, ground assistants, messengers and others, etc. P/O I.L. Colchester J.6032 left on a R.A.F. course and P/Sgt. A.T. Smith S.79011 has 1/2 training today. Pay and accounts officers from Bicester were held a tea - drinks here this morning and as usual there were no shortages or lags. Our Messengers Post Office is now operating in Squadron N.O. building in charge of P/O I.L. Colchester, S.163758 assisted by Sgt. G. Jones, Detachment, S.77881 and is doing a thriving business.</p>

Thalrose	July 11/43		Church services were held today at 1100 hours for R.C.'s and 1400 hrs. for Protestants. The R.C. service was conducted by W/O K. Johnson, 67369 and the Protestant service by W/O W.J. Butcher, 65723, of Hinton and both services were well attended. This afternoon six new Halifaxs, seen with the new periscope nose, were ordered out of the air one by one in strict succession and landed to dispersal areas, bring our A/C strength up to 11 unmodified. W/O G.D. Potts, 145248 and crew, and Sgt. A.W.G. Austin, 598291, and crew did some local flying and practice bombing during the afternoon.		
Thalrose	July 12/43		The Squadron C.O., W/O G.E. Harris, 17070, and crew made their initial flight as part of this Squadron today. Sgt. H.H. Hill, 612422, and crew and W/S F.J. W/S Tucker, R.O., 625530, received notification of his appointment to commissioned rank and left on a 48 hr. leave to obtain his uniform.

Flying training is the order of the day with all flyable aircraft being kept busy by engine crews. W/L. W.H. Thomson, J.1524, and crew with the 2nd Lt. W/L. G.S. Sutherland, C3180, as a passenger took off at 1100 hours for practice bombing at Stranraer but on finding the clouds over the target too low, did some local flying and landed at 1200 hours. Accommodation on the living sites is overcramped with sixteen airmen in a Messen tent which is too many. A conference of Station and Squadron officers was held at 1400 hrs. <sup>by</sup> W/O G.E. Harris, 57678, to promote harmony and eliminate overlapping. G/O H.W. Carscallen, D.F.O. newly appointed acting Station Commander arrived from Eastcote this afternoon. In the evening, two free movie shows put on by the I.M.C.A.s were enjoyed by large audiences. The picture entitled "The First of the Year" was very appropriate for an R.A.F. and R.C.A.F. audience, as it was the story of the life of the inventor of the famous "Blitzfire".

Other new arrivals on the Station are an R.C. Padre, F./L. F.H.B. Beishon O14601 and a Protestant Padre, S/L. E.G. Scott, O3651. Hara, E.12674d, W.O.A.P., Sgt. S.A. Walter, 1802702, P/N, Sgt. E.H. Wallace, R.78305, & Sgt. J.C. Desjardis, R.59777, air-guns, joined the Sqn, today on posting from 1664 Conversion Unit bringing our complete aircrew strength to 21. Brookes, O.B.S. of No. 6 Group, R.C.A.F. H.Q. to take over his new command. The A/Lt. looked very cool and collected in his shirt sleeves in his sunny stream-lined Boston Phoenix aircraft.</p>

Our first full month of flying ends with a total of 115 day and 11 night sorties for a total of 126 hours, 10 accidents and no fighter accidents. Total squadron strength is now about 600. The bulk of the squadron is now based in England. Subordinate operations continue to be carried out in all parts and all sections and action is negligible.</p>
