Consequently there was the hurried signing of a "AG".</p> <p>The Squadrons activities this month has been curtailed by the wholesale movement of all our personnel and equipment from Thelthorne to Croft, with the usual inactive periods of preparations of packing and moving and the ensuing disorganised interval of settling in. The sortie record file has naturally suffered as only four completed missions go to our credit. From these four missions two of our aircraft did not return and one man being killed while on operational duty bringing our casualties for this month to sixteen officers and men, one of these being a second pilot. This makes the grand total of 22 Officers and men lost due to enemy action since the Squadron was formed. The health of the Squadron this month is considerably worse than preceding months owing to the influenza epidemic which is sweeping the country. Our Medical Section is coping quite well though and there has been very few "In" cases reported upon. The morale of the Squadron for this past month has been increased considerably owing no doubt to our new surroundings, our change of administrative personnel and the festive season which is at hand. Our very able I.M.C.A. representative, Mr. Kirk Bell, has aided in this department very much and should be given credit for his efforts in the usual manner. The more favourable location of the sites of the camp and the camp itself is greatly appreciated by all. The only real problem in this line is the transportation system to the neighbouring towns should be improved</p>
